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CHESTER GOVERNANCE STUDY COMMITTEE- SUMMARY MINUTES December 19, 2022

Location: Chester Town Office Meeting Room and Online

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The meeting of the Chester Governance Study Committee was called to order by Co-Chair Jon Joslow at 2:36. Governance Study Group appointees Pat Bandzes, Cindy Lignar, Jon Joslow, Briana Jewczyn, Mike Sanders and Richard Strauss were in attendance. Committee member Ed Meehan was unable to attend. First Selectwoman Charlene Janacek was in attendance as were members of the community in the audience and on line.

1. Review and approval 11/16/22 minutes

The minutes from the 11/16/22 were amended by edits provided by Co-Chair Mike Sanders. A motion to accept and approve was made by Cindy Lignar and seconded by Pat Bandzes. The motion was accepted.

2. Followup from 11/16/22 meeting

The primary followup to the 11/16/22 meeting is the reports of the subcommittee's research and findings. This information was presented in detail under "#. Subcommittee reports" that follows.

3. Subcommittee reports

Identify Chester's key governance and management issues- Briana Jewczyn, subcommittee chair:

Briana summarized various governance and management issues that have been reported by Municipal Research & Service Center, Wilton First selectwoman update, and Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development. The information contained in these documents will be available and linked through the Governance Study Committee section of Chester's municipal web site. Her findings are consistent with the concerns expressed within the BOS charge.

Sample of Common Issues:

Summarized from Municipal Research & Service Center, Wilton First selectwoman update, and Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development.

- · Increased Complexity of Municipal Government, including:
 - The role of politics in administration
 - Increasing responsibility
 - Efficient and effective oversight of town operations and service delivery
 - · Ability to focus on long-term strategic planning, improvements, and investments
 - · Increasing population and the resultant increase in service demands
- · Form of Government
 - Capacity(ie. Time) for town leaders to respond & be accountable
 - Establishing effective management & administration practices; i.e. could professional management help?
 - · Effective and clear communication practices between departments, residents, and volunteers
- Continuity of Government
 - Timing of retirement of key personnel, and concurrent/staggered term lengths of appointed, hired and volunteer positions
 - Attracting candidates to serve in either elected or appointed office
 - Decreasing rates of volunteerism and low attendance at meetings

- •Expected duration = 60 minutes each
- •At least two Committee members present
- Document each interview with key findings and information

6. Recap of decisions and next steps

Mike pointed out that the work of the Committee in obtaining the information presented at today's meeting could have been provided by the Town if it had the resources and bandwidth within its staff.

The research phase is almost done and the interviews will be completed within a few weeks.

The format and content of the report is now being structured. There will be an executive summary that will refer to appended chart and resources. The more difficult section of the report will be our conclusions and next steps for the BOS and Town to consider. No recommendations for a specific structure will be made because that was not within our Committee's charter. However, the Committee did not prioritize considering the "Mayor/Council" form of government used by some large municipalities because of its relevancy and suitability to our small population.

The Committee was not constructed to perform a workflow or management study of Town operations, but the BOS may find that certain aspects of how we operate might be improved without changing structure. Although that will not impact other issues of governance, it might help the town operate more effectively.

Our 60 day scope did not include speaking to the various commissions, agencies and staff for a comprehensive understanding of all issues and opportunities for improvement outside of the basic issues summarized by the BOS and included in their charge to our committee. Those aspects might be considered by the BOS for future confirmation.

Pat said that the interviews will take a few more weeks and time will be needed to compile the information. Mike expressed a desire to stay on the 60 day schedule with a 1/13/23 draft. Material aspects of the remaining interviews might reveal new information that could impact our findings so Committee agreed to the 1/13 draft with an understanding that the draft could be amended between 1/13 and the BOS presentation on 1/25/23.

7. Other

Jon discussed the Committee's desire to make its research available to the public in almost real time and before the 1/25/23 BOS presentation because there is so much information to absorb in order for the Town to understand its options. The many references to public documents have been listed with the links to the actual documents. This link to be incorporated into the town web site. He explained that the Committee wants the public to have an trail of their thinking which is why the minutes to the first meeting were so detailed.

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8. Audience of Citizens

David Fitzgibbons- Thanked the Committee for its work. He is struggling with the "why". How is life going to be better for the residents of Chester and what problems are we solving?

Charlene said that the BOS drove this study, it is not Charlene's sole decision. Mike said that we might need to change in order to maintain and improve the quality of services to the public.

Any change in structure would need to be approved by voters. Briana pointed out that the Committee is providing the public with the base information so they can be educated on the options that are available.

Michelle Wallack- new to Chester (2 years). Regarding interviewing other towns, how did they educate the public so they could be better voters? What is going on in the minds of the voters? Taxes. The staff workflow should be studied and might impact any thinking about a Town Manager and its effect on taxes.

Karin Badger- Thanked the Committee for the information and work thus far. Suggested that the Committee makes a recommendation because we are so close to it. Would like a professional to manage and be accountable for Town management. Richard said that the report will include a section on "considerations" that might become the basis for the BOS next steps. The BOS, if they move forward, will have guidance from our Committee.
