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First Selectwoman's Corner

Our new Board of Selectmen - Pat Bandzes, Paul Radicchi and Cindy Lignar - began our official terms on November 21st, 2023. It's been many years since Chester has experienced a turnover of all three Selectmen at the same time, and we are very honored to be elected!

Because we had already been dedicated volunteers in town, and on regional boards and commissions, working alongside peers and town staff on projects, and have established roots here, our transition into our new roles has been more familiar to us and a continuation of our work at a different level.

I'd like to thank all town staff and partners for their support and assistance during our first few weeks. We have met and will continue to meet with all municipal departments, town engineers, the Region 4 Superintendent, our RiverCOG team, other important organizations, stake holders and legislators.

We are in the process of assigning Selectmen liaisons for our town boards and commissions. This is intended to help improve communications and collaboration across all functions of town government and ensure that we are operating efficiently and effectively. Regardless of assignment, we are all available at any given time as needed.

In collaboration with all, we are identifying projects to be prioritized and will seek opportunities for funding to help manage expenses. In January we will begin the budget process for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. Also, I realize that residents are concerned about the signifi-

cant increase in real estate assessments due to the surge in home values over the past few years. Connecticut law requires a revaluation every five years and the recent process in Chester resulted in an approximate 35% - 45% increase in residential property. But remember, your tax amount is calculated by multiplying the new assessed value of your property by the new mill rate which will be established in late spring 2024. The mill rate is expected to decrease to

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Chester Tax Relief Programs

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Contact the Assessor's Office for applications!

VETERAN EXEMPTION

To qualify, the veteran must be a resident, have served at least 90 days during wartime service and have received an Honorable Discharge. Original Discharge papers (DD-214) must be filed with the Town Clerk prior to October 1.

DISABLED VETERAN

To receive this exemption, the veteran must follow the steps above for the Regular Veteran Exemption as well as provide the Assessor with a disability rating slip prior to October 1.

ADDITIONAL VETERAN EXEMPTION

An additional exemption is available for veterans within certain income limits. Qualified applicants must apply biennially between February 1 and October 1.

Active members of the United States armed forces who have a motor vehicle is registered in Chester are eligible to claim a property tax exemption for one (or more) motor vehicle(s). An annual application must be filed no later than December 31.



HOMEOWNERS'-ELDERLY / DISABLED TAX RELIEF

The State provides homeowners who are elderly or totally disabled, and whose annual income do not exceed certain limits, an exemption amount based on a graduated income scale. Applications must be filed biennially between February 1 and May 15.

LOCAL OPTION-PROPERTY TAX RELIEF FOR THE ELDERLY / DISABLED

Homeowners whose primary domicile is Chester, who have been a Chester taxpayer for at least one year, and who are elderly or totally disabled may qualify for this exemption. Applications must be filed biennially between February 1 and May 15.

DISABLED TAX RELIEF

Property owners who are totally disabled are eligible for up to a \$1,000 exemption. Applicant must provide proof of total disability to the Assessor's Office prior to October 1.

RENTERS' REBATE

State law provides a reimbursement program for renters who are elderly or totally disabled and whose income do not exceed certain limits.

The rebate amount is based on a graduated income scale and calculates rent and utility payments made in the prior calendar year. An annual application must be filed between April 1 and October 1.



Chester Tax Collector The ABC's of Paying Your Taxes

- A ALWAYS REMEMBER to pay your taxes on time.
- **B BE SURE** to sign your check each time.
- C CAREFULLY LOOK over your check to make sure you filled in the amount correctly both on the legal line & in the numerical spot. Make sure the amount is accurate and the same in each spot.
- **D DON'T POSTDATE** your check, but if you must, be sure to put in a note to us that you need a later date.
- **E ENCOURAGE** your family, friends and neighbors to pay their taxes on time.
- **F FIND A WAY** to pay early and not to wait until the last week or last day. Emergencies happen that could prevent you from getting to the Tax Office on time.
- **G GO ONLINE** to check amount due if you don't have exact amount (if you can't reach the Tax Office).



- **H HOPE** that your payment arrives on time so that we do not have to charge you any interest.
- I **INCLUDE** a self-addressed stamped envelope & send in all copies of your bill. if you want a receipt.
- J JOYOUS holiday season & peace on earth to all!


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News from the Harbor Management Commission

As some of you are aware, Parkers Point Boat Launch was closed at the end of September by the towns building official due to liability concerns.


The commission is working diligently with industry experts and town

Planning & Zoning Commission Autumn Calendar was a Busy One!

DEVELOPMENT PROPOSAL

The Chester Planning & Zoning Commission had an uncharacteristically busy autumn calendar, which was dominated by the public hearings and consideration of a proposed 36-unit multifamily housing proposal at the former St. Joseph's Parish Center at 47 Middlesex Avenue.

The project was proposed by a development team of Vesta and Honeycomb Real Estate Partners, and included "affordable housing" restrictions on every apartment unit, qualifying the project for consideration under Section 8-30g of the Connecticut General Statutes. The application hearing and review process took place between early September and late November, spanning five public hearings and seven total meetings. Several hundred Chester residents attended and participated in these hearings.

The development proposal underwent several design changes, reducing the overall unit number from 40 to 36 apartments and revamping the stormwater management system.

At its November 20, 2023 Special Meeting, the Planning &

Zoning Commission voted to approve the application, with numerous conditions, by a vote of 6-3.

The details of the conditions, motion, and vote may all be found on the Agendas and Minutes section of the Town's website. As is required by State Statute, the legal notice of this decision was posted in the Hartford Courant on Friday, November 24th, setting in motion a 15-day legal appeal period, which expired on Saturday, December 9, at which point the approval would be final.

A LEGAL APPEAL

Just moments before the Town Hall was set to close at noontime on Friday, December 8th, a legal appeal to the District Superior Court was filed against the applicants and the Planning & Zoning Commission, claiming that the decision had been made incorrectly.

This appeal sets in motion a schedule of legal filings, argument briefings, and judicial review that may take many months. The Town and the applicants will jointly defend the *continued on page 10*

Commission's approval action under the terms of Section 8-30g. More information about this process may be obtained from the Zoning Compliance Officer, but for the most part, the Planning & Zoning Commission will not be involved directly in the appeal process. The Commission anticipates returning to business as usual in the new year.

The Chester PZC meets on the second Thursday of each month and it is holding in-person meetings at Town Hall as well as a virtual option as needed. The Zoning Officer holds regular office hours at Town Hall on Monday afternoons and Thursday mornings, and you can reach the office by emailing us at: zoningofficial@chesterct.org.

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
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Chester Fife and Drum Corps

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For the Third Year In a Row, Three Valley Regional HS Students Receive Yale Book Award

For the third time in as many years, three students from Valley Regional High School have been honored with the Yale Book Award. This year's recipients are Mia Bibbiani of Chester, Mikaela Carlin of Deep River, and Lucas Silva of Essex. Including this year's recipients, nine students from Valley Regional High School have been recognized with the Yale Book Award since 2021.

The Yale Book Award is conferred upon students in their junior year of high school for showing outstanding personal character and intellectual promise. Students throughout the US and internationally may be considered for the award, which is presented in partnership between Yale's alumni communities and schools within those communities. While multiple students from the same school may receive the award in the same year, it is rare for a school to achieve this kind of recognition for its students.

This year's three award recipients from VRHS – one from each of Chester, Deep River, and Essex – were recognized at the school's annual awards assembly in May. The book awards chosen for these students reflect each recipient's interests and possible future aspirations. Mia Bibbiani received a copy of "*Long Day's Journey* *into Night*" by Connecticut's Eugene O'Neill. Mikaela Carlin was presented with "*Accidental Conflict*" by Senior Yale Fellow Stephen Roach. And Lucas Silva was recognized with "*Interaction* of Color" by Josef Albers, the former Chair of the Department of Design at the Yale School of Art. Each book includes a bookplate inscribed with the student's name and recognizing the student's achievement as a Yale Book Award recipient.

Bradford Galiette of Essex, Secretary for the Yale College Class of 2008 and a former member of the Yale Alumni Association Board of Governors, remarked, "It's thrilling to see this year's awarded students exhibit the kind of intellectual curiosity, creativity, leadership, and strength of character that are so very much needed both here in our towns and in communities around the world. I'm grateful we find students as talented as Mia, Mikaela, and Lucas among us in our corner of Connecticut, and may we continue to wholeheartedly celebrate and encourage them and their classmates as they get ready to take their next steps."

The Department has been quite busy for the first half of the year, responding to date to 393 calls, putting it on course to meet last year's total call volume of over 900. Quite active in the community as well, members took part in supplying EMS coverage for the 4 on the 4th Road Race and Chester Fair, while hosted The Fall-Back Spring Ahead Craft Fair and Santa Comes to Town by Fire Truck. They also presented at Chester Elementary School during Fire Prevention Week, teaching cooking and stove safety.

In September, The Hose Company put into service its newest piece of apparatus, a 26-foot-long Landing craft Fire/Rescue boat with an enclosed cabin. Built locally by Chester Boat Works in Deep River, CT, the fabricators took meticulous care and worked with precision while manufacturing such an integral piece of equipment. The boat remained in the water into December, was put into drydock, and will be placed back in the water for service in March. Chief Grzybowski thanks the residents of Chester, elected officials, and the marinas for their support of the department's mission. "This boat was built for the future and will protect people for twenty-plus years to come. It is an honor to work for a town that puts safety first in all elements."

Lastly in December, a Holiday Appreciation Dinner was held to recognize the efforts of the members and their service throughout the year. Members were honored for their years of service, top responders to calls, Member of the Year and Chief's Award, as well as thanking past officers and elected positions.

Chester Historical Society 11th Challenge in March

Today is Tomorrow's History

Twenty years ago, in 2004, the Chester Historical Society held its first **Creative Challenge**, an opportunity for artists and creators to make pieces of art from antique artifacts. Ten more Challenges followed. The artifacts often came from early Chester manufacturers, such as Brooks and Bates. Sometimes, though, they were "found" in Chester, such as the perforated metal building squares discovered at an old Chester farm.

This spring's item came to Chester as a

donation from a Rhode Island antiques dealer who had heard the story of the Creative Challenge from a Society board member. When that dealer acquired an 1880s jeweler's chest filled with hundreds of antique "glasses" for pocket watches,

First Class Stamp Honors Chester Resident

CONSTANCE BAKER MOTLEY

Constance Baker Motley (1921-2005), long-time Chester resident and a founding Trustee of the Chester Historical Society,

will be honored with a first class, "Forever" stamp in the Black Heritage series by the US Postal Service. Available February 1st at post offices nationwide, Motley's stamp joins those of Martin Luther King, Rosa Parks and John Lewis.

For 40 years, Motley maintained a seasonal home in Chester on Cedar Lake Rd (1965-2005). She came to town after a pioneering 15-year career as a civil rights attorney who led the effort to desegre-gate public schools in the Deep South following the 1954 Brown v.

Board of Education ruling, which she helped to win.

She went on to become New York's first Black female State Senator, as well as Manhattan Borough President. In 1966, President Johnson appointed her to the federal bench, another historic first. Judge Motley was well-known locally and actively supported Chester events. She and husband Joel Motley patronized local restaurants, especially the Janeceks' "Lunch Box," as well as art

> galleries, particularly with shows mounted by Jack and Sosse Baker. Her close friendship with Barbara Delaney led to her role as a founding Trustee of the Chester Historical Society in 1970.

Judge Motley's stamp will be unveiled at a US Postal Service ceremony on Jan. 31st at the Constance Baker Motley Recreation Center in Manhattan.

Another celebration organized by the NAACP will be held Feb. 1st in New Haven, where Motley was born and raised.

A Chester party is planned by the Chester Historical Society and the Chester Land Trust, with date and details to be announced.

Chester Conservation Commission Invasive Plant Species in Chester: Garlic Mustard

Garlic mustard (*Alliaria petiolata*) was introduced from Europe during the 1800s as a culinary herb. The leaves are edible and, as its name suggests, impart a garlic flavor and odor though it is a member of the mustard family. Garlic mustard is a biennial herb (takes two years to mature and set seed) found in shady woodlands and along roadsides. It thrives in rich, moist soil, where it can divert water and nutrients from native species that grow in similar understory conditions. This aggressive invader spreads prolifically by seed, allowing it to outcompete native wildflowers and decrease biodiversity. This in turn threatens native insect populations, including butterflies and other pollinators.

IDENTIFICATION

First year – The first year plant develops as a basal rosette of leaves around a central tap root. The variable –sized leaves are kidney bean shaped with rounded teeth. The low growing rosette persists through winter.

Second year – The plant grows quickly the following spring reaching two to four feet in height. Small, white, four-petaled flowers bloom in clusters from late April through June. Second year leaves are more heart shaped and the teeth more pointed. As the flowers die back later in summer, they are replaced by long slender seed pods called siliques. By August, mature seeds disperse, and the entire plant dies. Its seeds will germinate the next spring, and the cycle continues. A single plant can produce 600 to 7,500 seeds.

CONTROL

Management options include hand pulling, cutting, and herbicide application. Hand pulling is an effective way to remove small populations because the plants pull up eas ily. If the plants have set seed, they should be bagged and removed to prevent seed dispersal. Try to disturb the soil as little as possible as disturbance will bring buried seeds to the soil surface and may allow them to sprout. Firmly tamp down any disturbed soil after removing the plants. For larger populations, cutting the stems to ground level with clippers, scythe, or a motorized string trimmer is effective. Cut during late spring or early summer when the plants are in flower. If there are any viable seeds, bag and remove cut stems. Continue to cut annually until the seedbank is depleted. Hand pulling and cutting are the most environmentally friendly removal practices and are preferred. However, herbicides, such as glyphosate or potassium salt-based products are also effective, especially as a spot treatment during the first year of ground level growth. Note that herbicides will not affect subsequent seedling emergence.

- 4 cups garlic mustard greens (best in spring), washed and patted dry
- 1/2 cup toasted walnuts or other nuts

Garlic Mustard Pesto

There are many recipes on the web; below is one from Reformation Acres.

- ¹/₂ cup parmesan cheese
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- Salt & black pepper
- ¹/₂ cup extra virgin olive oil

Process the garlic mustard, walnuts, cheese, seasonings, and lemon juice in a food processor until well ground. Slowly pour in the olive oil and process until fully combined. Taste and adjust seasonings. The pesto may be frozen to preserve it for later use.

Chester Attains Silver Certification from Sustainable CT



In October of 2023, Chester was awarded Silver Certification by Sustainable CT, a statewide initiative that inspires and supports communities to become more efficient, resilient, and inclusive. Chester demonstrated achievement in 12 sustainable impact

areas ranging from vibrant arts and culture and well-stewarded lands to inclusive community building and thriving local economies.

Chester was able to document accomplishments related to its historical, cultural, natural and business resources with the input of many organizations including: Chester Sustainability Team (SuChest), Chester Historical Society, Chester Merchants and Tourism Liaison, Chester Public Library, Chester Land Trust, Chester Cemetery Association, Conservation Commission, Public Works Department, Cedar Lake Watershed Commission, Chester Rotary and many others. Below are just a few actions that demonstrate Chester's sustainability:

Arts and Culture

With its amazing array of art galleries and artisan shops, offerings at the Chester Public Library such as the "Cosmic Watercolor Workshop" and "What to Do With a Blank Page", high quality programs at the Historical Society, musical entertainment at the Sunday Farmers Market, summer concerts at Cedar Lake, movies at the Meetinghouse, and a brilliant seasonal starry night, Chester continues to be a regional center for arts and culture.

Town-wide Earth Day Celebration 2023

Chester Land Trust coordinated its annual town-wide cleanup, collecting a record-breaking 54 bags of garbage and 18 bags of recyclables. The Conservation Commission and Chester Rotary held a pollinator plant promotion and giveaway at the town pollinator garden, while the Chester Library, Historical Society, merchants and local farmers hosted events downtown including an artful chalk drawing event for kids and adults.

Chester Fair Zero Waste Program

Chester is a national leader in its effort to create a zero-waste country fair. Building on success in 2022 with a 47% diversion of recyclables and compostables from the traditional waste stream, the rate improved to 59% in 2023. With the cooperation and support of fairgoers, the collection of food scraps, recyclables (plastic and aluminum cans and bottles, corrugated boxes and other items) continues to improve, moving us

toward the ultimate goal of Zero Waste! A new feature at the 2023 fair was a six-spouted "Water Monster" (water dispenser) that was in almost constant use refilling water bottles and compostable cups.

Electronics Recycling

Two collection events at the United Church of Chester parking lot in 2023 resulted in the collection of more than 800 pounds of e-waste in April and 3,000 pounds in October.

Region 4 Food Scraps Program

Chester Elementary, Essex Elementary, Deep River Elementary, John Winthrop Middle and Valley Regional High Schools initiated a food scrap collection program this school year. With financial support from the towns, local citizens and a generous match from Sustainable CT, students in Region 4 recently began separating food scraps and plain paper into bins provided by Blue Earth. Blue Earth picks up the bins weekly and takes them to their facility where the waste is turned into compost and energy.

Tackling Invasive Plants

In the fall of 2022 and with funding from several grants, Chester Land Trust initiated a Japanese knotweed control and native plant restoration program at its Carini Preserve, coupled with educational programs, articles and posters. The Conservation Commission continues to educate citizens with fact sheets on its website and periodic articles in Chester Events.

Kudos to all of the people and organizations who contributed to Chester's Silver Certification, and especially to Cindy Lignar who chaired the Sustainability

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Team and submitted most of the documentation for the certification process. As Cindy takes on her new role in town government, we hope to build on the groundwork that has been laid to envision, encourage and enact more sustainability programs in our community.
